Greetings Roadrunners. Well the weather has finally gotten warmer and more ridding time is available. Tom and Judy still need your input for rides you would like to go on. As I'm writing this quite a few members from the Chapter are on the way to Wing Ding. Of those members who are going I wish a safe journey. A few tips that were sent out are:

- Trouble on the road? Remember all GWRRA Members are covered by 'Rescue', call 888-233-9127 with your Member number and the agent number on your membership card for roadside assistance.
- Registration and packet pickup is available at the Alliant Energy Center on Tuesday from Noon to 5:00pm prior to the Welcome Party in Middleton! You will need to have picture I.D. and please do not plan to pickup any packets other than your own.
- Registration and packet pickup is open early (7:00am) on Wednesday prior to Opening Ceremonies. <u>It is not necessary</u> to have your armband for Opening Ceremonies, however, a select few of the Premium Door Prizes will be drawn during Opening (from the fullregistration numbered armbands).
- The start time for the Welcome Party in Middleton has been backed up to 3:00pm as opposed to the 2:00pm listed in the Spotlight.
- Bringing your bike in for service or installation? Please make sure you obtain an appointment slip from the exhibitor prior to bringing your bike to the back of the expo hall for entry. Due to <u>fire marshal safety regulations</u>, this process must be strictly monitored and there is no parking of bikes in aisles or walkways in the case of emergency evacuation. Building entry is subject to space availability and bikes must be returned to the general parking areas immediately after service or installation. We appreciate your patience and cooperation in this regard.
- Do signup for the mobile text alerts by **texting WINGDING to 555-888** to get the latest news and info.

- Do be cautious of the weather and stay hydrated!
- After entering the main entrance to the Alliant Energy Center, off of Rimrock Road, take an immediate left or right into the **general parking areas**.
- Do note that **Handicap placards** must be visibly displayed in order to park in designated Handicap Areas.
- Do remember to lockup or stow any valuables, helmets, etc.
- Please use a kickstand plate if you have one!
- The start times and 'Doors Open' times are listed on your tickets for ticketed meal/entertainment functions. If ordered, your tickets will be in your packet.
- Please note the <u>No Pets Policy</u> of the Alliant Energy Center. Assistance animals will need to have documentation available.
- The host city for **Wing Ding 37** will be taking hotel reservations and event registrations at their booth in the lobby starting Wednesday after the Opening Ceremony. Be sure to stop by and check out the Wing Ding 37 bundle packages! Member Services will also be taking bundle reservations until Monday, July 7th.
- Lost and Found is located at the GWRRA Info Booth in the lobby area of the Alliant Energy Center.
- Do sign up for Demo rides early as they tend to fill up!

From the Chapter Educator.

What does riding at the Limit mean? MSF defines riding at the limit as staying near the very limits of crashing. Aggressive riding such as challenging the road should be taken to the racetrack. Many track days and track schools are available around the country. Safety requires riders and drivers to be predictable, courteous and cooperative.

What does good risk offset mean? Good risk offset is when you driving abilities are better than the risks you are taking. If you start taking more risks than you can handle then you are leading yourself to be in a crash.

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TERRY'S ARKANSAS ADVENTURE

Terry's back road tour around Arkansas, with side trips to Mississippi and Missouri was like something a professional guide would put together. He, Linda, Tommie and I left out on June 2nd for seven days of riding, companionship and relaxation. The weather was always a factor, and while we spent a lot of time either in rain, threatening rain or dodging rain, we managed to stay dry most of the time. I think all of us got drenched at one point or another, and Linda had the pleasure of figuring out what did and did not work in the rain on her first long ride as a passenger in their side car. She also found a way to make her ride a lot more comfortable by stopping at a hardware store and purchasing some black PVC foam and placing it around the inside edges of the car that her knees were hitting on bumps.

In the interest of brevity I have summarized our week of events:

The Roads

We took in tours, shows, shopping and history, and did all kinds of roads, from the big slab, farm land, some really great, tight twisties covered with tree canopies and heavy bumper to bumper traffic in Branson. I have to say that the city of Branson has re-designed roads since we were there last, and the bumper to bumper traffic is all but eliminated once you get to the bypasses. Taking the trip with someone who knows how to navigate these bypasses was a huge perk.

The Tours

The Lakeport Plantation in Lake Village, AR. was built around 1859. The outstanding tour guide, displays, original artifacts from the house and information provided explained the history of the people who lived there and how they lived, and the house itself allowed you to take yourself back and visualize what life could have been like for the residents. (The slave aspect was addressed, but the focus was on the history of the home and families who lived there.) The house was built with 10 foot doors and windows. The windows lifted straight up, allowing the most ample ventilation possible and the ability to walk from inside the house directly to the porch. Even old Abe Lincoln could have gotten through those windows

with his top hat on! The doors, windows and original cistern that still stands were among the most interesting physical aspects of the house. They still had a cast iron stove in a little room that was the kitchen (that had to have been absolutely stifling in the summer) and several rusted out artifacts, like a noodle making device. It also makes one realize how very spoiled we are to remember that they didn't even have fans back then, when they all wore those heavy clothes. It was well worth the time to tour.

The Delta Cultural Center in Helena, AR. What a great presentation of blues music and artist history! Not only blues, but gospel, rockabilly and country. Individual artists' pictures, songs and histories and their part in the local "King Biscuit Time" blues show on radio station KFFA, which had over 15,000 broadcasts by 2009.

Mammoth Spring State Park. Spectacular falls and a tour of the hydroelectric plant constructed in 1925. It produced power to the area until 1972 with over 10 million gallons of water flow an hour. The average water temperature is 58 degrees.

Pea Ridge National Military Park. North of Rogers on Hwy 62. In depth and very detailed displays, artifacts and movie on the Civil War battle that determined the fate of Missouri.

The Shows

"The Dutton's". If you ever go to Branson you NEED to see this show! Three generations perform. Mom and Dad, their kids and grandkids, and all are musical. Mom started each child on classic violin at the age of 3, and their talents are just mesmerizing. Unbelievable. Go see it!

"Celtic Ladies, Dublin's Irish Tenors." We were kinda disappointed in this show. They sang more pop then Irish. The female soprano was beyond outstanding, especially in the opera selections. She could have gone solo and it would have been perfect. The guys were just okay. That's just our opinion. You might love it.

"Rock n Roll Reminisce" Great tunes from simpler times, fun show.

"Tribute to Marty Robbins" Absolutely fantastic. A three person band, but don't let that be deceiving. Probably THE most talented guitarist I've ever heard. They sang "El Paso". 'Nuff said!

"Smoky Mountain" This is another must see. The theater is very small, but is elevated so everyone has a great seat. The audience is the congregation in a small church. The presentation is hysterical theater mixed with good old southern gospel songs. You will laugh your head off!

Clay Cooper show. Great show! Lots of audience interaction. Huge auditorium was packed. He was brought up in Wylie and got his start at Wylie Opry. We were able to visit with him briefly after the show and discovered we know some of the same people.

Terry and Linda went to see the Oak Ridge Boys while we went to Smoky Mountain. They'd seen Smoky Mountain and we'd just recently seen the Boys. They said the show was great.

The trip had gone without a hitch till we got to Paris on the way back home. We were on Hwy 82 (just a few hours from home) when Tommie hollered at me on the CB to pull over. I was pulling the trailer, and smoke was pouring from it. I pulled over into an empty lot right next to a storage unit place. Terry and Tommie got on their backs and surveyed the underside of the trailer, trying to figure out what the problem was. As it turned out, the axle at the frame had come unwelded and broke. Prior to this happening someone had lost a tire in pieces and chunks were scattered in the road. I was doing some evasive maneuvers to keep from hitting it with my bike or the trailer and flipping it back on Tommie, who was tail gunning. I made a sharp move, and that's when it came unwelded.

So we're all four wondering what in the heck we're going to do. It's about 4pm in a small town on a Sunday afternoon. After talking to Terry, we decided to ditch our plans and go with him for his test run since we were going to be out of town when he did his ride with the chapter. Long story short? Terry had a blowout in the middle of nowhere. I guess it was meant to be that he was not by himself when it happened. Or were his guardian angels watching over him?




BRANSON, MO.

Shortly after crossing from MO to AR we encountered this beautiful one lane wood bridge. It crosses Beaver Lake. It is called "the little Golden Gate".



Ready for rain....


The drive through the Ozarks was beautiful. The Devil's Den State Park area is gorgeous. All the campgrounds were full.
