There were at least a dozen different rides to local destinations with a variety of lengths. Thanks to Jim Evans, who did much of the ride organization, volunteer ride leaders and tail gunners and everyone else who helped put on this great event. Barb and I have had a busy month. We spent the first weeks in Indiana doing some house repairs and celebrating Barb's Mom's 99th birthday. We got back home for one day, attended a group gathering at Napoli's then got on the bike the next morning to go to the ride-in in Kerrville.

We had a pleasant surprise at the Napoli's gathering since Greg and Kathy Oehler attended for the first time. They both ride 2 Gold Wings. Greg rides a two-wheeler and 2 Kathy rides a trike. We hope they can continue to attend. Welcome!

The extended Wiggins family had several bike related issues at/after the rally. My daughter-in-law's three-week-old Harley Road Glide had a battery afflicted with infant mortality. She stopped to get gas at the rally, and it refused to fire up again. Even a jump

- 5 start attempt failed to get it started. She ended up getting it towed and the bike is fine after the battery replacement. As you can imagine,
- 6 Lori was not pleased with her beautiful new bike at the time, but battery problems can happen anywhere or any time. Barb and I
- 9 stay overnight at their house in Gatesville when we go to or return from Kerrville. We10 did that again but when we left for home the
- next morning, we rode about a mile and hit a piece of debris in the road that put a 3/4" slash in my rear tire. My TMPS showed rapidly

decreasing air pressure in the rear tire, but we made it back to their house with 5 lbs. left. Of course, that was on Monday and all bike shops were closed. I took the rear wheel to a couple of auto repair places to have it patched from the inside (one of which broke my TPMS sensor) but eventually got the wheel back on holding air and planned to leave the next morning. After reconsidering riding with that tire while two up and pulling my motorcycle trailer, I decided that it wasn't worth the risk. My son was kind enough to loan me his Gold Wing that was also set up to pull my motorcycle trailer so we could get home. However, now I had his bike in Greenville and mine was still 200 miles away in Gatesville with a questionable tire. So, Barbara and I spent the entire day Saturday trailering his back to him and mine back home. In the meantime, I ordered a new tire to replace the damaged one that had only a few thousand miles on it and sourced the TPMS parts and hope to get it all correctly repaired this coming week.

Ross and Barbara also had a tire problem on their way home. A chunk of rubber from his front trike tire separated about 30 miles from their home. Fortunately, it still held air and they made it home safely.

Motorcycle Safety Campaign Share the Road

TxDOT's statewide "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" motorcycle safety and public awareness campaign urges motorists to look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections, where motorcycle collisions most commonly occur.

Why should drivers be aware of motorcyclists when traveling Texas roads?



On average, one motorcyclist dies in a crash on Texas roads every day. In 2022, 562 riders lost their lives and 2,422 were seriously injured in crashes. More than half of fatal motorcycle crashes result from collisions with other vehicles. Drivers simply don't see the motorcycle or misjudge its distance and speed. The small size of motorcycles can make them appear farther away when they're actually closer. The combination of congested roadways, distracted driving and the difficulty of seeing motorcycles in traffic has led to many preventable fatalities each year.

What are some tips for safely sharing the road with motorcycles?

- Take extra care when making a left turn. It is safest to let the motorcycle pass to avoid turning in front of the rider.
- Pay special attention at intersections Nearly one in three motorcycle fatalities happens at a roadway intersection.
- Give driving your full attention. Even a momentary distraction, such as answering a phone call or changing the radio station, can have deadly consequences.
- Look twice when changing lanes. Check mirrors, blind spots, and always use turn signals.
- Give motorcycles room when passing them.
 Move over to the passing lane and don't crowd the motorcyclist's full lane.
- Stay back. If you're behind a motorcycle, always maintain a safe following distance. When a motorcyclist downshifts instead of applying the brake to slow down, it can catch drivers off guard since there are no brake lights to signal reduced speed.

Horny Toad HOG Safety: Rain Safety

Greetings Road Toads! The Rainy Season is upon us. Whether you ride in the rain or not is up to you, however, there is always a chance that you could get stuck in a situation where you must.



Last summer Lori and I were caught in the rain while we were doing a loop around North Texas. We rode through a lot of the rain but did take a break when it was too heavy to be safe.

Here are a few tips to help keep you safe in the rain:

Slow Down – Reducing your speed and increasing your following distance will help you stop or swerve in time due to the decreased traction available to your bike.

Be Smooth – Again due to wet and slippery conditions, making quick or abrupt control inputs to your bike may cause a loss of traction.

Remember vision is reduced for everyone — You as a rider will have to deal with rain accumulating on your visor and fogging in your helmet. There are products available to help with this, but nothing is perfect. Be careful when applying chemicals to your visor and or glasses, make sure the chemical is approved for the application. Also, cagers have reduced visibility which is why you should wear bright colors and make sure all your lights are working.

Avoid slippery surfaces – Painted lines, metal surfaces, tar snakes, and cat's eyes are very slippery when wet. Remember the road is most slippery in the initial stage of rainfall.

Check your tires – Do your T-CLOCS. Specifically, check that your tires have enough tread and that they are inflated properly, and make sure your lights are working properly.

Get good gear – Good rain gear enhances your safety in two ways. One, it is usually brightly colored or highly reflective. Two, it increases your comfort. It is very hard to ride smoothly when you are cold, wet, and shivering.

Try not to ride in storms – There is a point where the rainfall is too much to be safe. There can be too much water on the road for your tires to handle which will cause hydroplaning. You also need to be wary of lightning and high winds.

Experience is the best teacher; get out and ride. If you get caught in the rain, do what you can to mitigate the risks. Don't ride if the risk is too high.
