## Texas District Director Dan and Donna Rymarz

n March 20th, Texas will host its spring Ride -In out of Kerrville, Texas. We have close to 60 people who have already registered, and we expect more before that event in late March. The goal is to make sure we have plenty of rides as well as leads and drags to ensure that no group is larger than ten motorcycles. Destinations will be interesting, and places to eat are plenty. Every evening, we will host a meeting in the Boone Crockett room at the Y.O. Ranch [Hotel] to discuss the day's rides and plan for the next. Folks will be able to sign up as well as voice ideas to enhance the experiences. We are currently looking for restaurants that can handle larger groups of people so that many of us can dine together if we so choose. As we have done in the past, the district will provide plenty of drinking water and snacks. All you have to provide is enthusiasm.

Spring is almost here, and our thoughts return to the road. Are our motorcycles ready for the road? The most dangerous of vulnerabilities when riding, besides people around us being inattentive drivers, is the rubber that we roll on. How old are our tires? Most of us will simply look at the tread and determine that there's still rubber yet to be used. But age can be a factor that we must think about. When were these tires purchased and installed? How hot did they get in my garage? Sometimes you need to replace old motorcycle tires regardless of tread, because the rubber compounds used in tires can age, lose elasticity and strength over time, and cause the tire to fail, even if the tread appears adequate. For this reason, most tire manufacturers recommend replacing tires after 5 to 6 years, regardless of existing tread. Tires harden and lose grip, which can affect your handling, braking, and safety. A new set of tires will cost way less than a crash and will also improve your ride quality and performance. Besides, fresh new tires feel so good!

Your Texas District team is looking forward to seeing so many of our friends, and making plenty of new memories. Just make sure your bikes are ready, and that you are well rested for three days of riding. Safe travels!

## Membership Enhancement Coordinator Gary and Becky Wheatley

### **Powersports Helped His Physically Challenged Father Enjoy Family Outdoor Time** By Scott Schloegel

I grew up as one of four boys in the rural Upper Peninsula of Michigan where I spent nearly every day outside doing something with my brothers and their friends. At the end of my driveway was the familiar 1970s worn-down single-track that ran up and down highway M-35, cutting into every lawn and driveway along the way. My home was on the shores of Green Bay, where we fished in the summer and rode powersports vehicles on the frozen bay in the winter. My family owned restaurants, which occupied most of my parents' time, but to decompress from the busy work week we also had a 280-acre "camp" where we hunted, farmed, and rode go-carts, motorcycles, ATCs, ATVs, and snowmobiles.

When I was 3 years old, my father contracted polio, resulting in near full loss of the muscles in his legs, relegating him to using a walker, crutches, and power scooter for the remainder of his life. My dad couldn't go out and play soccer, football, or basketball with us boys, but he could pull his leg over the seat of a snowmobile, ATC, or quad, which became our outdoor time together. We spent a ton of time hunting, fishing, and cutting wood that was used for heating our home and building a large addition to the house. After starting out on a Sears, Roebuck and Co. go-cart with a Briggs & Stratton engine, my dad bought me a Kawasaki 75, in 1975, so I could ride with my older brother who had a Honda Trail 70. Many kids in our neighborhood had a minibike for the spring, summer, and fall, and a snowmobile for the winters. It was part of our culture. The unique two-cycle exhaust aroma and the thwap of the exhaust still invoke a Pavlovian response in me to this day.

In the early 1980s, I secured my motorcycle endorsement by completing a local Motorcycle Safety Foundation course which enabled me to ride my motorcycle to and from high school. My love of riding was cemented and has never waned since.

Following three years working for the Michigan House of Representatives, 18 years working for Congress, and another seven years working as a Presidential appointee in two administrations, I now serve as the SVP of Government Relations for MSF, MIC, SVIA, and ROHVA. I lead the Government Relations Office team that works with all 50 states and the U.S. Government to promote safe riding/ driving and sensible policies that benefit our powersports industry. In October I celebrated five years with the associations. The MSF Government Relations team and I were integral in securing a U.S. Senate resolution honoring MSF's 50th anniversary this year, and a Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month recognition from President Biden last year.

This truly is a dream job representing the industry that is such a huge part of my family memories and that affords people of all economic and physical abilities the opportunity to get outdoors to enjoy our beautiful country. Like the times riding quads and snowmobiles around camp and across frozen Green Bay with my dad, some of my most treasured time today is going on rides with my daughter, who loves cruising scenic and windy roads on the back of my bike while she decompresses from her graduate school studies, and while I decompress from dealing with elected officials. I'm honored to be a small part of MSF's history and look forward to another 50 years of high-quality rider education for generations to come.

## **Riding Safely from Motorcycle Safety Foundation / Feb. 24 2024**

Riding a motorcycle properly is a skill you can learn. It's not something you are born with, like having red hair or blue eyes. It takes thinking and practice to ride one well. Unfortunately, many riders never learn the critical skills to ride safely and enjoy the sport to its fullest.

The staff at the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) has prepared this booklet to provide you – the motorcycle rider – with important tips that can help you to ride safely. Read these pages carefully. Thirty minutes spent reading this information can be one of the most valuable half-hours of learning you have ever had.

You will learn about:

- **Rider Gear:** Essential riding gear for street motorcycles includes helmets, eye protection, jackets, pants, gloves, boots, raingear, hearing protection, and high-visibility gear. Wearing the right gear enhances safety and comfort while riding.
- Legal Responsibilities: Understand your legal responsibilities, which cover licensing requirements and the necessity of having insurance. Adhering to these legalities ensures a safe and lawful riding experience.
- **Knowing Your Motorcycle:** Familiarize yourself with your motorcycle's controls, gear shifting, braking, and turning. Mastering these fundamentals is crucial for safe and effective handling of the bike.
- **Pre-Ride Checks and Maintenance:** Conduct pre-ride checks and maintain your motorcycle regularly. This includes inspecting tires, controls, and ensuring all lights and signals are functioning properly.
- **Road Awareness and Safety Strategies:** Implement the SEE system (Search, Evaluate, Execute) for heightened road awareness. Techniques for increasing your visibility to others and enhancing your ability to see other road users are vital for safety, especially at intersections.
- Handling Special Situations: Learn to handle special situations like emergency braking, braking while leaned into a curve, coping with skids, and navigating across poor road surfaces, including steel bridge gratings and rain grooves. Understanding how to ride in rain and wind, and how to deal with animals on the road, is also crucial.
- Equipment Failures: Prepare for equipment failures such as blowouts, a stuck throttle, or a broken clutch cable. Knowing how to respond to these situations can prevent accidents.
- **Group Riding and Passengers:** Group riding and carrying passengers require specific considerations. Adhere to guidelines for group riding formations and ensure that passengers are well-informed about safety and riding protocols.
- Loading the Motorcycle: Secure all loads on your motorcycle, using bungee cords or cargo nets for items like groceries. Utilize a tank bag for optimal weight distribution near the bike's center of gravity. Ensure nothing on the gas tank or inside the fairing interferes with steering for safe riding
- **Drugs, Drinking, and Riding:** Be aware of the dangers and legal consequences of riding under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Riding sober is essential for your safety and that of others on the road.
